Tahir Wyatt was raised in Philadelphia and converted to Islam when he was in high school. He graduated from the Islamic University of Madina in Saudi Arabia with an Associate Degree in Arabic (1999), a BA in Hadith Science and Islamic Studies (2003), a post-graduate certificate in Islamic Studies (2004), MA in Aqeedah (Islamic Creed) (2009), and Ph.D. in Aqeedah (2017). He has published several journal articles and served as the Chief Editor for many scholarly publications. In 2012 Dr. Wyatt was appointed by Royal Decree as the first person to teach Islam in English at the Prophet's Mosque in Madinah, the second holiest site in the Muslim World. He was also the first Simultaneous Interpreter for the imams of the Prophet's Mosque. Since returning to Philadelphia in 2018, Dr. Wyatt has continued to be active in research, writing, teaching, and community organizing.

Katherine (Trinka) Klima is a retired Nurse Midwife and Clinical Medical Ethicist. She completed Hahnemann University's Physician Assistant program in 1977. She subsequently completed an MS in Nursing from the University of Michigan, a Doctorate in Nursing Practice from Madonna University, and a post-doctoral certificate in Clinical Medical Ethics from the University of Chicago. Her research interests include Islamic approaches to reproductive technology and end-of-life issues. Dr. Klima provided clinical women's health care for more than 30 years and then worked in nursing administration at a Saudi hospital until her retirement in 2017. She currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Qur'an, Arabic, and Reflection Institute (QARI) and the Cherry Hill Free Clinic, where she also chairs the Quality and Safety committee.
